

While the person's age is not an exact date of birth, it at least provides a "ballpark" figure useful (1) for tracking the person from one census to the next, especially if
other people have the same name, and (2) for locating the person in any existing vital records.

Using Census Microfilm

The 1850-1940 censuses indicate the person's state or country of birth, which helps narrow the geographic scope of search for the specific town of birth.

Date of marriage

The 1850 census (column 10), 1860 census (column 11), 1870 census (column 14), and 1880 census (column 12) indicate whether the person had married within the
year.



T. WYTOVICH, SR. SUCCUMBS FROM THROAT ILLNESS

Proprietor of Hotel at 5th and Mulberry Street Dies in Hospital

FUNERAL ON FRIDAY

Theodore Wytovich, Sr., for many years proprietor of the Wytovich Hotel, at the corner of Mulberry and Fifth streets, died sudenly at the Geisinger hospital this morning at 7:00.

Death was due to a throat ailment suffered over a period of several years.

The deceased entered the Danville institution as a patient last evening at 9:15.

Born in Austria, March 3, 1881, the deceased was reared to young manhood at the place of his birth and at the age of eighteen years came to this country, locating in Shamokin. He married Mary Karpiak eighteen years ago.

The wife and the following children survive: Theodore, Jr., of Seymour, Conn., John, Oscar, Anna. Walter, Olga, Helen, Joseph, Donald, Gloria, and Paul, all of Shamokin. The first three named are by a former marriage.

Two step-brothers, Victor and Samuel Wytovich, both of Seymour, Conn., also survive.

Funeral services will be held at 9:00 Monday morning, from the Ruthanian Catholic church of Transfiguration, of which the deceased was a member. Burial will be in the parish cemetery,

The body will be taken to the home of the father-in-law of the deceased, Dimitry Karpiak, of 251 South Sixth street, where friends and relatives may view the remains.

Mrs. Stephania Karpiak, 92, of 251 South Sixth Street, oldest member of Church of the Transfiguration, died yesterday morning at 12:30 in Northumberland County Hospital, Trevorton Road, after an illness of five years. She had been a patient in the hospital four and one-half years.

A native of Galicia, Austria, Mrs. Karpik was born in 1870. She came to the United States when she was 18 years of age. The late Shamokin resident was the oldest member of St. Ann's Society. She was married in February, 1890, in Church of the Transfiguration to Dymitri Karplak, who died a number of years ago.

Survivors include two daughters, Helen, at home, and Stephania, Whittier, Calif.; one son, Oscar, Calif.; 13 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren, and one brother, Stephen Pasteryck, Ambridge.



John Smith (XV 1) is said to have married about seven years before his emigration, and to have had five children upon his arrival in America. He left Ireland with his family, probably early in the year 1720. The voyage was so tempestuous that the emigrants encountered great danger, and were much delayed, but they came at last safely to land with all their belongings, and with one more child than they started with, Robert having been born during the passage across the ocean.

On their arrival in America they proceeded promptly to what was then called "the Brandywine Settlement," in Chester Co., Pennsylvania, which had been started by some of their countrymen who had very shortly preceded them, and which developed in the first half of the eighteenth century into a great Scotch-Irish community. The country near Philadelphia had been largely taken up by the earlier emigration of the Quakers, who were mainly from southern and western England. Back of them, and to their northward, in and about the Great Valley of Chester county, the Welsh settlers had made their home, and the north-of-Ireland men, when they came, pushed on to the hilly country in the northern and western part of what is now Chester county,

Before January 1, 1820


- Passenger Lists were not required by law
- Prior to the Revolutionary War Many British subjects weren't listed on passenger lists because they were traveling from one area of Britain to another.
- No central depository for passenger lists
 - Published Pennsylvania Archives (Ancestry & Fold 3)
 - Many were published in books and journals.
 - PA State Archives
- No passenger lists prior to 1820 at the National Archives

- Two-Step Process
 - 1. File a Declaration of Intent
 - Also called "First Papers"
 - 2. File a Petition for Naturalization
 - Also called "Second Papers" or "Final Papers"
- Information varies depending on the court and time period




Search Strategies

- Check Indexes
 - Passenger and Immigration Lists Index by William P. Filby
 - Not available in Ancestry Library Edition
 - Pennsylvania German Pioneers by Ralph B. Strassburger and William J. Hinke
 - Name index in Volume III
- Trace relatives or neighbors who may have emigrated with your ancestor
- Trace male ancestors first
- Use wild card searching (*/?) and variations of names
- Check Canadian border crossing records
- Check foreign passenger lists created at points of departure
- Use maps to trace your ancestor's likely path of migration
- Use Ancestry Card Catalog and the Family Search Collection List to focus on specific resources or geographic areas

Use the Search Menu to narrow your search to the category of Immigration & Travel or by geographic are
